		The GLA is looking at ways of improving its focus on high risk
		areas and is working closely with similar organisations involved
		with criminal activity, trafficking of workers and other forms of

		labour abuse.
		The organisation is reviewing its arrangements for licensing which can be unduly burdensome and are considering the use of civil penalties. Whilst considering ways of becoming more streamlined, more effective and less intrusive the GLA's mission to protect vulnerable workers remains intact.
		Other reviews:- Lord Taylor answered a PQ from Baroness Young relating to the GLA, an exchange in the House of Lords followed.
		<i>McDonald review</i> - The Government's interim response to the independent Farming Regulation Task Force has published recently. In May the Task Force, chaired by Richard MacDonald, made recommendations to reduce unnecessary red tape and regulation for the farming and food processing industries. Ministers will publish a detailed agenda for implementation of all the Task Force recommendations early this year.
		<i>Forestry Task Force</i> - the report, published on 27 October made over 40 recommendations to improve the regulatory landscape for the forestry sector. The key recommendation for the GLA is that forestry should be excluded from the scope of the Gangmasters Licensing Act. In the short term forestry should be exempt from the cost and administrative burden of the requirement for licensing and inspection under the Gangmasters Licensing Act.
		It was confirmed there were no moves to widen the scope of the GLA. MM is keen to clarify the scope of licensing.
		The GLA had budget cuts as set out in the Comprehensive Spending Review 10. It is currently under cost pressures with an office relocation, a reduction in back office staff and a recruitment freeze.

	Update	NC is concerned that the alert system is not working particularly well and asked the group what information they required. The GLA had responded to the request for rating of alerts.

5	Revised Protocol	NC presented version 5 of the protocol document.
	document	It is a concern of the GLA that they do not engage enough with

		<ul> <li>suppliers ahead of talking to labour users. GLA agreed that where there was a problem the first step should be to talk to the LP and LU together. Only if that process failed, or where it was manifest that such a process would not work (e.g. because of collusion between the LU and the LP) should the retailer be approached directly. The group were in agreement with this approach recognising that the process had to be sufficiently timely to avoid retailers being "ambushed" e.g. by the media.</li> <li><b>3.6 Communications</b> - NC explained that this relates to multi agency enforcement operations where the GLA are not taking the lead. In these circumstances the GLA would not be able to approach the labour user but will provide feedback as and when permitted to do so.</li> <li><b>5. Publicity</b> - It was noted that it was an issue for retailers if suppliers don't report to them critical issues that subsequently appear in the press.</li> <li>If the GLA intends to issue a press release at any part of the investigation the labour user needs to inform the retailer. The GLA will ensure that the retailer is fully aware prior to any media release.</li> <li>LN asked for clear guidance and WS agreed to write the guidance to be added to the Protocol document.</li> <li><b>Appendix 1 – Retailer/Supplier Protocol Decision Tree –</b> reviewed.</li> <li>It was acknowledged that retailers need to take decisive action. The GLA will only contact retailers when there is an unsatisfactory outcome of an LU or LP meeting.</li> </ul>

5	Centre for Social Justice	MM welcomed Andrew Wallis from the charity unseen.uk who is taking the lead on the Centre for Social Justice's major inquiry into modern slavery. He gave an overview of their work in combating slavery and trafficking. AW highlighted how slavery can impact on supermarkets and asked the group to consider how they were combating this. Once recognised it was questioned how to take this forward in a positive way. The ALP have produced guidance on identifying abuse of workers. David Camp, ALP to be approached for a copy of document. 6	Proposal for DVD	It was proposed that the GLA with Manor Fresh and Two Sisters produce a training DVD for cascading through the supply chain via retailers. The DVD will focus on issues experienced by agency workers and in particular what could happen if workers are trafficked. The estimated cost would be £6k and would last for 15 – 20 minutes.
